The document also demonstrates the transfer of ownership from the seller to the buyer. This is a document that will be a necessary form for the registration process in the state of Florida. Declaration on the publication of the odometer (Form HSMV-82993) – Required only for the sale of a vehicle to a new owner in order to register with the Road Safety and Motor Vehicle Safety Department. In the past, an online retailer that sold to customers based in a particular state had to have some kind of physical presence in that state before the state could require the seller to collect and pay state sales tax. However, the requirement for physical presence was lifted in a June 2018 Supreme Court decision in South Dakota v. Wayfair Inc. Nexus in Florida Unlike many other states, Florida has not updated its laws for online retailers as a result of Wayfair. So at least for now, the only law actually on the book precedes Wayfair and concerns the so-called nexus. Many states, including Florida, use the term nexus rather than physical presence in their sales tax laws, regulations, or other official documents. In this process, these states have sometimes defined continuity in ways that could go beyond physical presence. A more specific statement of what counts as a physical presence under Florida law can be found between different vendor definitions (meaning that a person or entity is required to pay sales tax) in Section 212.06 of the Florida Sales and Use Tax Act. More specifically, the dealer under this act includes every person... which maintains or has within [Florida], directly or by a subsidiary, office, distribution house, store, or house, warehouse, or other place of business. As for nexus, Section 212.0596 of the Florida Sales and Use Tax Act applies to the taxation of mail order sales and defines when the sale of mail order orders is subject to sales tax. The section contains the following statement: Seller, purposefully or systematically utilize the market provided by this State by any media-assisted, media-facilitated, or media-requested means, including, but not limited to, direct mail advertising, unsolicited distribution of catalogs, computer-assisted shopping, television, radio, or other electronic media, or magazine or newspaper-advertising or other media, creating a connection with that state. Addition the section also states more generally that a trader must levy sales tax if the dealer or the trader's activity has sufficient links with the State to form a link. As a more concise and readable option, the Florida Department of Revenue (DOR) has a website covering nexus for out-of-state businesses: Florida Attorney General – The retroactive Florida Collection is unlike many other states in that they never introduce what is often called the Amazon Law. These state laws required at least large online retailers like Amazon to collect and pay sales taxes. Two of the largest states, New York and California, introduced examples in 2008 and 2012. However, following Wayfair's decision, in the summer of 2018, Florida's Attorney General asked a state court to allow the state to require out-of-state sellers to retroactively collect the tax. The matter has not yet been resolved since the end of 2018. If you sell in Florida through a website, resolving this matter may end up being important to your business. Proposed federal legislation At the federal level, Congress has repeatedly considered legislation that would affect online retailers and how online sales taxes are collected in all states. In the wake of Wayfair, new proposed federal laws deal with minimum sales amounts before sellers may be retroactively required to collect sales tax (The Online Sales Simplicity and Small Business Relief Act of 2018 (H.D. 6814)) and prohibiting states from retroactively requiring sellers without physical presence in the state to collect sales tax (No Retroactive Online Taxation Act of 2018). Closing words - For now, with the exception of the Florida attorney general's action in the summer of 2018, Wayfair's decision has not yet led to a change in Florida's sales tax laws. However, many other states have already passed laws that require what they often call remote sellers to levy sales tax. If these states are any indication, it may not be long before Florida, too, updates its laws to explicitly require out-of-state sellers to collect and pay sales tax.
